This is a story about my nephew Geoff Verigin (born March 17, 1966) who has succumbed to Metastatic Esophageal Carcinoma (Throat Cancer) on February 01, 2024. He was the fourth son to his father Russel and his mother Tillie (nee Cheveldave) Verigin. Geoff was a very private person and a limited number of people attended by his side during his demise at Talarico Place in Castlegar, B.C.



We formed a "Family Circle" with his brothers Allan and Dan, son Myles and partner Ericka. They then extended their hands to Uncle Elmer and Aunty Marilyn and first cousins, Nona, Lori, and Tamara while we blessed him on his final journey.

Geoff married Lorrie Bacon from Trail, B.C. They were blessed with a son Myles on December 20, 1993.

Myles has earned a Red Seal as a Journeyman Electrician and currently employed by Salesforce, assisting companies to implement Carbon Accounting for 'net zero' emissions.

He is living with his partner Ericka Rankin-Freisen who is also a Journeywomen Electrician, took courses and is now working as a Masseur.



Geoff served his apprenticeship and received his interprovincial Certificate as a Red Seal Carpenter, following his father's trade.

His speciality became Finish Carpentry in which he excelled and was a tradesman of choice by Millwork Contractors. He was the preferred Finishing Tradesman in the Kootenays.

This was a yearly hobby. His desire was to construct one last Igloo in 2024 but he lacked the strength and nature did not provide an adequate snowfall.
